THE ORDER OF MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. If able, the head of the home should take the role of "Leader" (L) and the family the role of "Group" (G). The whole family should try to learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: Bear Your Cross and Be Jesus' Disciple!

Catechesis Notes for the Week—Labor Day—As we pray this week during our country's observance of Labor Day, we are reminded that as Christians we see our life's work as the means by which we serve our neighbor in love. The work that God has called us to is not principally for our own benefit, but for the benefit of our neighbor. God loves, cares for, provides and helps others through the service of Christians who live faithfully in their vocations. The strength to be faithful in our daily work comes from the Lord's forgiving Word, and by our work for others we reflect and confess our Savior whose work brought the gift of salvation to all people.

INVOCATION

The sign of the cross ◆ may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism.¹

Luther, in his Small Catechism, encourages Christians who pray the Morning and Evening prayers: "In the morning when you get up and in the evening when you go to bed, make the sign of the holy cross over your head and heart and say, 'In the name of the Father, and of the Son (�), and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.'"
