THE ORDER OF MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. If able, the head of the home should take the role of "Leader" (L) and the family the role of "Group" (G). The whole family should try to learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: Rejoice in the Lord Always!

Catechesis Notes for the Week—The Fifth and Sixth Petitions—Faith in Christ's Righteousness Brings True Freedom—Faith in Christ's righteousness, which is a free gift of God's grace that covers all our sin, gives true freedom. It is by the gift of Christ's righteousness that we learn to commend our fellow sinners to God, not holding their sins against them but sincerely forgiving them and gladly doing good to them, especially when they sin against us (Fifth Petition). It is by the gift of Christ's righteousness that we are delivered from every evil (Sixth Petition). This is why faith continues to pray that God would preserve us in His forgiveness against all evil. Satan's desire is to tempt us away from the free gift of the righteousness of Christ. When our faith moves away from Christ's righteousness then false belief, despair, and other great shame and vice come into our hearts and lives. So the faith that receives Christ's righteousness is always calling upon Him in prayer to preserve us in the freedom of His righteousness.

INVOCATION

The sign of the cross ❖ may be made by all in remembrance of their Baptism.¹

God surely tempts no one to sin, but we pray in this petition that God would guard and keep us, so that the devil, the world, and our flesh may not deceive us or lead us into false believe, despair, and other great and shameful sins; and though we are tempted by them, we pray that we may overcome and win the victory.	Third Grade +

Prayer on the Fifth Petition of the Lord's Prayer:

Father in heaven, do not look upon our sins or deny our prayers on account of them. We are neither worthy of the things for which we pray, nor have we deserve them, but we ask that you would give them to us by grace, for we daily sin much and deserve nothing but punishment. So we, too, will sincerely forgive and gladly do good to those who sin against us. In your mercy, hear us, for the sake of Jesus Christ, our Savior. Amen.

Prayer on the Sixth Petition of the Lord's Prayer:

God, you tempt no one to sin, so we pray that you would guard and keep us so that the devil, the world, and our own sinful nature may not deceive us or mislead us into false belief, despair, and other great shame and vice. Although we are attacked by these things, we pray that, trusting in you alone, we may finally overcome them and win the victory; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Luther, in his Small Catechism, encourages Christians who pray the Morning and Evening prayers: "In the morning when you get up and in the evening when you go to bed, make the sign of the holy cross over your head and heart and say, 'In the name of the Father, and of the Son (�), and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.'"
