SERVICE NOTES FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Jubilate means "Make a joyful shout," from the first verse of Psalm 66. This Psalm expresses the joy and thanksgiving that are the response of faith to God's creative and redemptive acts. This joyful Psalm attributes praise and glory to God alone, for it is He that "turned sea into dry land" to deliver His people form bondage through the Red Sea, and it is He that keeps our soul among the living," delivering His people from bondage to sin and death by the waters of Holy Baptism. He alone is worthy of our worship and prayers. "But certainly God has heard me; He has attended to the voice of my prayer. Blessed be God, who has not turned away my prayer, nor His mercy from me!"

The people of God are pilgrims and sojourners in this world, looking ahead to a destination yet to come. We are those who wait on the Lord. But, Jesus tells us that the wait is just a little while. Though you must experience sorrow for a time, though you must live as strangers in a world that is at enmity with Christ, yet your sorrow will be turned to joy when He returns. The little while of weeping shall be replaced with an eternity of rejoicing in the presence of Christ the crucified and risen Savior.

HOLY COMMUNION IS OFFERED TODAY

As Christians who believe that the Bible is inspired by God and that every word written in it is God's holy word, we believe that we receive the body and blood in, with, and under the bread

and wine. While this is something that goes beyond our human understanding, our faith allows us to accept this as true. God warns us in the Bible that anyone who doesn't understand this teaching or who denies this real presence of Christ's body and blood will do damage to his or her soul if not properly taught first (1 Corinthians 11:27-29).

As a congregation we care about people and about the spiritual well-being of individuals, especially those attending the Lord's Table today. If you are a guest and desire to commune, please speak to the pastor before the service. Our altar is open to those who confess oneness with us in doctrine, are not under church discipline in another congregation, and are members of our congregation, one of our sister congregations in the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod [WELS], or a member of our sister synod, the Evangelical Lutheran Synod [ELS].

BAPTISMS OF ARIANA & JOEY WENZ

In today's service we have the privilege of witnessing two little lambs brought into the sheepfold of Christ's Church. Through the waters of baptism Ariana and Joey will be made children of God and heirs of heaven. We rejoice with Tony, Tracy, Ariana, and Joey in this amazing gift of God's grace and pray that God keeps them in his grace all the days of their lives!

The Paschal Candle is lit this morning as a symbol of the resurrection victory of Christ over the darkness of sin and death. It emphasizes the presence of the resurrected Christ and the link between a believer's baptism and the resurrection (Romans 6). For this reason, this candle is lit at every baptism, funeral, and throughout the Easter season of the Church Year.

The name Paschal comes from the Greek, *pascha*. Before the time of Christ, this word was used for Passover; after Christ, Christians took to using the word when referring to the Festival of the Resurrection.







PSALM OF THE DAY


Psalm 66 | CW p. 90

The heart of this Psalm is not found in how much noise and praise can ascend to our God, but in why we should praise and sing to Him at all. The reason for joyful singing is summed up in one phrase: "the works of God" (v 3, 5). And what are God's works? He overcomes our enemies, especially the one we fear the most death (v 3, 6-7, 9, 12). To be sure, His work involves affliction and suffering and hard testing for us (v 10-12). Yet Our Lord does not let us down, but comes through for us (v 16-20). For this reason, we declare and sing aloud without bashfulness what Our Lord has done (v 16).

The Creed itself was crafted as a confession of Scripture in opposition to the Arian heresy, which denied that the Lord Jesus and the Holy Spirit



Praise to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In love he has blessed us with every spiritual blessing. He raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms and placed all things under his feet for the benefit of the Church. Now have come the salvation and the power and the kingdom of our God and the authority of his Christ. To him who sits on the throne and to the Lamb be praise and thanks and honor and glory for ever and ever:

The Service of the Sacrament begins with the Salutation (as did the Service of the Word). Once again, the congregation assents that the Pastor has their approval to speak on their behalf. Additionally, in the Preface, the Pastor encourages the congregation to "lift up their hearts" and "to give thanks" as he gives thanks on their behalf in the Proper Preface and the Eucharistic Prayer.

The words of the Proper Preface (italics) are a part of the Proper, or a component of the liturgy that is specific to a particular day of the Church Year. This particular Preface is appropriate (or "Proper") during the season of Easter.

PRAYER OF THANKSGIVING

We are humbled by the compassion you have shown our fallen race.

This Prayer of Thanksgiving is appropriate for Easter. We pray out of thanks (cf. the Salutation: "Let us give thanks to the Lord.") for the Easter blessings we receive in this Sacrament through the sacrifice of God's Son and ask that he bless us through the eating and drinking of Christ's body and blood.

Lead us to rejoice in the pardon offered and sealed in this Sacrament and to live a life worthy of your name. The Lord Jesus lives! Alleluia.

M Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: "Take and eat. This is ♣ my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it all of you; this is • my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."

Worshippers may make the sign of the cross in the seventh petition as they pray to be "delivered from evil." This action serves as a remembrance of baptism and its connection to Christ's death on the cross, the means by which God has delivered us all from evil and why we pray that he will "grant us a blessed end and graciously take us from this world of sorrow to himself in heaven."

The pastor speaks the Lord's own words. These words give and bestow what they declare: the body and blood of Christ.

DISTRIBUTION

Those who will be receiving Holy Communion today may wish to read **Personal Preparation for Holy Communion**, found on page 156 in the front section of the hymnal. This page helps us put into practice what the Bible encourages: "Everyone ought to examine themselves before they eat of the bread and drink from the cup." (1 Corinthians 11:28)

The Pax Domini is drawn from Jesus' greeting to the Apostles after his resurrection from the dead: "Peace be to you." The Pastor offers us the same peace in the presence of the risen Christ in bread and wine.

In the Agnus Dei (Latin for "Lamb of God") we confess the mercy and peace that we receive from the Lamb of God in His Supper. We come to the Lord's Table hungry and thirsty, and He feeds us with His body and refreshes us with His blood. It is the Lord's Supper. As Luther reminds us, "Our Lord is at one and the same time chef, cook, butler, host, and food."

Good Shepherd confesses and practices the Biblical teaching of a Closed Communion. We ask that only members of the Wisconsin Synod [WELS] or the Evangelical Lutheran Synod [ELS] join us at the Lord's Table. If you have questions concerning our

communion practice, or would like to inquire about how you, too, can commune with us, please speak with the Pastor following the service.




